## Save Owasippe Update

There has been much activity since our last newsletter surrounding all aspects of the potential sale of Owasippe. The four main points are that a public zoning hearing has been set, a letter of intent to purchase was sent by the OOEC to the Chicago Area Council, two mediation sessions were conducted between the CAC and Blue Lake Township, and a new board was approved by election to the CAC Executive Board.

**The Hearing:** The Blue Lake Township's Zoning Board of Appeals is holding an open meeting on April 19 at 1 p.m. at the Blue Lake Township Hall for the purpose of setting specific definitions of the Forest-Recreational Institutional zoning designation. Because this was a new designation years ago when it was applied to all camps in Blue Lake Township, the zoning board has been challenged to set definitions of what specifically is permitted under the FRI category. With those definitions now agreed upon by the zoning board, the open meeting is seeking public comment before those definitions are made permanent. These definitions will be applied generally to all land zoned FRI throughout the township, including Owasippe.

This meeting is open to all and will contribute to laying the groundwork for a later hearing set currently for May 22 at 1 p.m. at the Blue Lake Community Church. In that May hearing, the ZBA will hear directly from the Chicago Area Council regarding their specific rezoning request. The Owasippe Outdoor Education Center will also present its plans to the ZBA for informational purposes. Other members of the public are welcome to make presentations at that meeting as well.

The May meeting is a result of the ongoing court case in Muskegon County Circuit Court in which the CAC is suing Blue Lake Township claiming a "taking of the land" when it was rezoned years ago. The judge in that case ordered that the CAC exhaust all avenues of resolution through the township zoning process, including an appeal to the ZBA, before the case would be heard in court. The CAC filed their case before attempting a zoning variance or an appeal on their rezoning request from the ZBA.

**The Letter:** As many people heard at the Annual Meeting and Dinner Dance, the Owasippe Outdoor Education Center has submitted a letter of intent to purchase the entire Owasippe

Scout Reservation. The letter was presented to Jack Jadel, Mike Hughes, Glenn Emig and Jim Stone of the CAC. It spells out some key points for a possible purchase of the property:

- The buyer would be a partnership between public and private entities including individuals, not-for-profit agencies and local government agencies
- The buyer would include at least one tax-collecting entity (a township, city, county, state or federal agency) so as to be eligible for funding through the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund (MNRTF)
- The price would be set based on the current zoning (i.e. no need to rezone from its current designation) and determined by an independent party based on MNRTF processes

The MNRTF was created so that companies have to pay into the fund before extracting natural resources from land in the state of Michigan. The state then uses that money to protect land deemed important to the people or state of Michigan.

The council replied to the letter with a series of questions, which the OOEC has answered. No other reply has been received at the time this article was written except that they are discussing it. It is important to clarify that this is not an offer for purchase, but a letter of intent, which opens a dialogue and moves the process forward.

We see this as a chance for the CAC to to relieve themselves of the "financial burden" of owning the camp while still protecting it from development and ensuring that Scouts can continue summer camp at Owasippe for many years to come. The OSA is in full support of the OOEC's letter, plan and proposal, and we hope the council views this as a chance to reach a solution that is a "win" for everyone involved.

**The Meetings:** Representatives from Blue Lake Township and CAC have met twice over the past few months in mediation to try to establish a dialogue between the two sides. Though the mediation was court-ordered as a result of one of the lawsuits put forth by the CAC, both sides approached it with an open mind for discussion.

## Save Owasippe (cont. from pg. 1)

We have little information about the events or discussions within those meetings because all parties signed non-disclosure agreements and are not permitted to discuss specifics. We do know however that no agreement was reached in terms of rezoning the Owasippe property. The stalemate means that the court hearings will continue as scheduled. The next set dates are hearings in the Muskegon County Circuit Court Aug. 8-10 and 14-17.

**The Election:** By a vote of 26 to 17, the membership of the CAC approved the Officers Slate proposed by the Council Nominating Committee. The vote was held at the Holiday Inn Mart Plaza on March 15th.

This most recent vote was focused solely on the Officers Slate, the only slate to not be approved by the membership at the January elections. After the results were read at that January meeting, a representative of National Council BSA reportedly threatened those present that one more failed slate for the officers would result in National taking control of the CAC and installing their own leadership.

The CAC Nominating Committee did make some changes to the officers slate that were requested by the membership after the January meeting, but the low turnout and close vote are proof that not all requests were granted.

**The following officers were approved:** President, Michael Hughes; Council Commissioner, Charles Beavers; VP Program, William Hooks; VP District Operations, Glenn Emig; VP Finance, Kirk Brannock; VP Membership/Relationships, Ron Temple; VP Properties, Jack Keenan; VP Administration, Tom Thilman; VP Learning for Life, Reginald Hill; VP Planning, George Walper; Treasurer, Harvey Camins.

The new officers took office at the close of the meeting. No definitive action has been taken by this board yet as to their position on the divisive issues in recent history, such as the sale of Owasippe or an overhaul of council governance practices. They have promised a more open dialogue between volunteers/Scouts and the Council. ♣

## Added Bonus for the Shopping/Gift Card Fundraiser

Last year the OSA raised almost \$1,500 by selling shopping/gift cards. This fundraiser is easy and costs nothing. The OSA buys the gift cards at a discounted price and sells them to you at face value. You can spend money you would normally spend and give back to the OSA at the same time. This fundraiser can be significantly more profitable if we can get more people to place orders. Here are three ways we are trying to accomplish this.

1) We made the order form easier to use. There is only one side to fill out, and there are no percentages to worry about (the OSA earns money no matter what type of gift card you buy). The new form includes only the top-selling gift cards, so you can easily find the cards you want to buy.

2) We added a second order form for you to give to a friend. All you need to do is cut the gift card form in half, fill out the return date, and give the bottom portion to a friend (or copy it and give it to many friends). This second

order form includes a letter explaining the fundraiser and identifying the OSA. Friends, family members and coworkers are often happy to help out the OSA and they too can save time buying graduation gifts and Father's Day presents. Plus, you will only have to pay shipping once when you bundle orders together, so it will save everyone a little money.

3) For every order you turn in (your own plus any additional orders from friends and family), we will enter you in a raffle for a \$50 Amazon.com gift card. The winner of the raffle will receive a \$50 gift card along with his or her regular gift card order.

Volunteers arrive one hour before each concert to set up the concession stand, and then we sell beer and other refreshments while listening to the music. Some concerts last only four to five hours, and the festivals run all day long. Check your calendars now and let one of our co-leaders know what Saturdays you are available.

## Crane's Pie Pantry Restaurant Fennville, Michigan

The winter of 1937 was nasty in the upper Midwest. It trapped a bus full of tourists, or a few truckers (accounts vary) in Glenn, MI, forcing them to eat whatever was on hand, thus creating the nickname that Glenn still carries as "The Pancake Town." Glenn is just down the road from Fennville, home of the real star attraction, Betty. It was in 1937, perhaps during that same winter storm of the trapped bus, that a seven-year-old dog named Betty died.

Betty lived in Chicago with a lady with no children. The

lady loved her dog, and when Betty died the lady had her stuffed. When the lady died, she willed Betty to a niece named Kate. Kate worked part-time on the pie crew at Crane's Pie Pantry Restaurant, a family-owned business that was decorated with old farm junk and goofy mannequins. Kate kept Betty for a while, but she got tired of vacuuming the dead dog. She asked the Cranes if they'd like to take Betty. The Cranes said yes. And that is when Betty, 50 years after she had died, finally reached the spotlight.

Betty has become the mascot of Crane's Pie Pantry Restaurant. She sits in a sleigh on the enclosed porch. A sign around her neck gives the sparse facts of her life. Aside from Betty, the restaurant is known for its delicious food, pies, cider, preserves and bakery items.

To see Betty for yourself – and maybe enjoy a great meal or slice of pie – Take I-196 to exit 34, take Hwy 89 (124th Ave.) east about three miles to Crane's Pie Pantry on the right. ♣

## **Scout License Plates a Possibility**

House Bill 3395 is making its way through the Illinois legislature, and Troop 7 of Springfield, IL, would love some help pushing it through. This bill would create specialty license plates for passenger cars in Illinois that would carry the Eagle Scout and Gold Award (Girl Scouts) logos.

The bill is being sponsored by representatives Jill Tracy (R-Quincy), Al Riley (D-Matteson), William Black (R-Danville), Rich Brauer (R-Springfield), Paul D. Froehlich (R-Schaumburg), and William Davis (D-East Hazel Crest).

Applicants would have to prove that they have earned the ranks associated with the license plates. Proceeds from the plate sales would be cycled back to the Boy Scout and Girl Scout councils based on the number of plates sold within their counties. This bill passed out of the House with only three "no" votes on March 29. It now proceeds to the Senate where Sen. Kirk Dillard, an avid Scout supporter, and Sen. Larry Bomke will carry this bill forward.

We encourage all Scouters to pass the word via their Troop e-mail lists and Troop newsletters to write your State Senator urging him/her to vote in favor of this legislation.
