The Master Plan

The Owasippe Task Force

The vision of the Owasippe Scout Reservation (OSR) Master Plan is that Chicago Area Council (CAC) operates OSR so that Scouts have a strong desire to return to our beloved camp for new adventures every year from the time they are Webelos to age 17. A great program drives attendance, advancement and Scout retention. Quality program requires dedicated and

motivated staffing. The CAC must market the mystique and experience that is OSR."

The above is the opening paragraph of "The Owasippe Master Plan," aka "The Vision of Owasippe." This forward-thinking rough draft will be of great interest to anybody would like a glimpse into the future of Owasippe, in terms of program and in terms of Mother Nature.

Some highlights:

The non core areas of camp may be sold provided these two basic tenets are maintained:

a. Any land sold will be required to be maintained in a conservation easement style that keeps the property in at least as good of condition as presently exists; and

b. Campers at Owasippe will continue to be permitted to use the land for hiking and nature studies.

Our camps should not be defined by their meal service plan. Blackhawk and Wolverine shall ultimately offer both hot pack and dining facility dining plans.

Other than the COPE Course at Carlen, these camps will not be utilized for summer camp operating facilities. While they are available for year round outpost use, there are no plans to allocate funds for development of these areas.

By maintaining Camps Crown and Carlen in this conservatory fashion, the CAC is protecting the watershed of Lake Wolverine. Additionally, the Master Plan Committee recommends moving the southern boundary of the core area of camp down to the Holton-Whitehall Road.

Staff at the section camps typically reside in wood sided, wood framed, site built cabins in areas known as "staff row". The cabins are built for two staff members each, with one screened window on each of the two flanking sides of the cabin. There is basic electricity in each. Relative to the other scout camps we have visited these facilities rank near the bottom in terms of comfort and aesthetics. With some fiberglass insulation and wood paneling, these cabins could be substantially upgraded. Perhaps the installation of a ceiling fan could be considered. These efforts would be another component of demonstrating our respect for the staff.

Kybos are firmly woven into the lore of RAGBRAI, the Register’s Annual Great Bicycle Ride Across Iowa. “Kybo Roulette,” in which riders waiting in line guess which toilet door will open next, is a common and celebrated diversion on the ride.

A group of Boy Scouts spotted a grass fire that burned several acres at a Muskegon County camp.

It happened around 3:30 p.m. Monday at the Owasippe Scout Camp of Holton-Whitehall Road in Blue Lake Township.

The fire is one-half to one mile away from the road in an area surrounded by woods.

The scouts alerted leaders, who reported the fire to 911.

Several townships and the Department of Natural Resources had the fire under control by 5 p.m.

Firefighters say the fire burned up to four acres of property, but did not threaten any buildings. They do not yet know what caused the fire. ♣

Bags Tournament – Single Elimination
12:30 PM Start

Rules for Players:

The bean bag toss game is played with 2 teams of 2 people.

Each team gets 4 bean bags to throw.

Each player throws from behind the front of the boxes. This is the foul line. The player must not pass the foul line or the players throw does not count and the bag is removed from play.

Each team alternates shots beginning with the team that had scored last.

Scoring is as follows:

Points are scored when a player has a bag on the board or in the hole. Only one team can score per round. Therefore points cancel each other. A point scored on the board is equal to 1 point; a point scored in the hole is equal to 3 points.

An example of cancellation is as follows: Team one has 2 bags in the hole and 1 bag on the board equaling 7 points (3 pts. + 3 pts. + 1 pt. = 7 pts). Team two has 1 bag in the hole and 1 bag on the board equaling 4 points (3 pts. + 1 pt. = 4 pts.). The lowest score is subtracted from the highest score to get the points earned for team one (7pts. - 4 pts. = 3pts.). Team one earns 3 points in this round and gets to throw first in the next round.

Game is played until one team scores 21 or more points. A team cannot win by a white wash which is 11 - 0.

A bag that is tossed in play and knocks another bag off or in the hole is legal.

A bag that bounces from the ground onto the board is not a legal play. This bag must be removed from the board and play is then continued.
