Guest Lodge Report

After a long, long wait for a record winter snowfall to melt at Owasippe, rehab work continues in earnest at the Guest Lodge (GL). If you are not aware, we were successful last Fall with completing the new annex and foundation which included new windows and doors throughout. A replacement porch was constructed and new cedar window frames were added. The entire structure, old and new, was also treated with a brand new steel roof (forest green color). For glimpses of what has been accomplished so far, go to www.owasippe.com and to the OSA's Facebook page for some great photos. Seeing what has been done is an inspiration to completing the task.

As this is written, electrical service is being brought back to the cabin underground and

connected to the electrical panels. Electricians and plumbers meet out there next week to scope out the building and prepare their schematics with the roughing in of the lines shortly thereafter. The Muskegon County Health Department will arrive on site in days to also tell us where to place the new septic tank and field so that this may also get done in the coming weeks. As soon as the electric and plumbing is roughed in, we will do other work inside including the installing of two new bathrooms and a refurbished kitchen. But, simultaneous to that, 1 x 12 cedar boards will be attached to the outside of the annex to continue on with the log cabin motif. As an FYI, the GL will be made ADA accessible and heating will be via electric baseboard heat (installation no later than the Fall).

The annex will be outfitted with insulation and

interior panels probably at the Fix-It Weekend on May 16-18 and/or other work weekends being planned. There is plenty to be done. The Guest Lodge will be a bee hive of activity in the coming weeks.

Benefactors have stepped up to get us an A/C unit for the building as well as to furnish the kitchen with donated cabinets, appliances and a marble counter top. BOOYA! We are so thankful for those contributions soon to arrive.

The entire goal is to make the GL a functional building for this summer's STEM Outpost program (i.e., Science, Technology, and Engineering and Math merit badge programs). Plans are now being made to move the Radio Outpost there from the vicinity of the old Wolverine South swimming pool and to outfit it with a new 72-foot antenna. Come mid-August, work will continue to retrofit the Guest Lodge to be a winter dormitory complex for unit rental. Sleeping capacity should be around 24-30 depending on the placement of bunk beds which still have to be acquired by the end of the summer.

Completed work so far has cost us around \$38,000, a pretty reasonable amount considering what has been done. We have \$18,200 in the Guest Lodge Fund but will need more funding to get everything done the way we would like. Everyone can help us here with a little or a lot, whatever one can afford.

This Stop: Pekadills (503 South Mears Avenue Whitehall, MI 49461)

Kurt and I did set out to explore other dining options in the Owasippe area, but let's be honest, Pekadills is a staff/camper/OSR visitor favorite! For those of you who have been there, I am sure you will share my sentiment. For those of you who haven't: enjoy.

Kurt and I began on staff together in 2002 and quickly became friends, and so naturally we took the chance to catch up and eat lunch with each other together on staff last year. The idea to try out new places in the area originally came after we went to Pekadill's an irresponsible amount of times.

Pekadills is a lovely location to get a fresh lunch or dinner in Whitehall. They have delicious sandwiches, salads, soups, and combinations that continually send Owasippe staff back for more throughout the summer. Their staff is friendly and makes note of you coming back (especially if you arrive wearing a nametag...). One of the best parts of the Pekadills experience is location. Opened in 1983 as an ice cream parlor, your dining options include the front ice cream parlor, back in-house dining, or the beautiful, cozy garden seating out back with falling water and various flowers/foliage! Peks always has a daily special (specific sandwich with a side and soup!) that is not only delicious but a great price. He is now a bus driver for the high school at which he taught. He has former students with their own TV shows, Chiefs of Medical Teams, mechanics, teachers, stunt men, mummies and daddies, quite a few deceased, and says he tried to be part of each of their lives.

Susan Derby

Susan Derby (current Reneker adult leader, previous High Adventure Director/Trek Guide) decided to look more into teaching after being asked for the 20th time by a scout leader "So where do you teach?" Knowing she loved working with high school age kids from working at camp, she earned her double major Math/English degree from Baker College and holds a secondary teaching certificate in Michigan. She is currently in a long-term sub position teaching Algebra/Pre-Calculus at Reeths-Puffer High School (if you're an OSR regular, this should ring a bell)! News about Jim Chandler

OSA friend and former Reservation Director Jim Chandler has been struggling with stage 4 pancreatic cancer. He will be presented with the Distinguished Eagle Scout Award on Sunday April 27. Captain James Lovell (Apollo 8 & 13) will be making the presentation.

If you want to contact Jim, he has asked that you either write or email in lieu of calling, due to the potential volume of calls. A letter from his brother, Rev. Thomas R. Chandler, detailing his medical condition, has been distributed at his request. Though we do not have the space to print it in its entirety, an excerpt follows. The full letter can be found on Owasippe.com.

"...Jim and I both know that there are many people concerned about Jim and want to know about his situation. Jim has been in complete charge of his medical treatment from the beginning of his treatment. Disclosure of details about his medical condition has been also his decision. He has been concerned about unnecessary worry and concern by those who he loves and who love him that might be caused by the ups and downs of his fight against this deadly disease. However, he also recognizes

the importance of updating you with the latest news that came with his doctor's consultation.

The news is not good. The chemotherapy treatment is not having the desired effect on Jim's resistance to the disease. Instead the cancer has spread aggressively. It now is affecting his liver as well as the pancreas, his lungs, and his duodenum. Jim continues to lose weight and strength as the disease advances. The cancer measurement "marker" has recently soared to over 2500 (normal is 31), and recent comparative imagery scans confirm the spread and advance of the disease. Jim continues to be mentally and emotionally alert but has increasing difficulty with his deteriorating physical condition.

The good news is he is still emotionally strong and is not allowing this bad news to discourage his fighting spirit. He continues to have excellent medical care and continuous home care by George Sparks, Jr., and many friends who come to help.

In discussions with Dr. Bettag [Jim's oncologist] it is clear that Jim does not have many medical options. The present chemo treatments are not succeeding and are actually affecting him negatively with the severe side effects that he suffers. Changing the chemo formula is not an option because Jim's physical condition does not provide the strength that is needed to withstand it. Alternative therapies are not available for him because most programs require long waiting periods (typically 4 weeks) before he would qualify for entry. It is Dr. Bettag's opinion that Jim should consider Hospice to make his life as comfortable as possible for the time he has remaining. Jim has made that transition and is now a hospice patient.

Hospice is a program designed for support to patients whose life expectancy is 6 months or less. Jim will be able to remain at his home and receive care there. His medications would continue. Dr. Bettag said that he would personally visit Jim at home. He is director of the local hospice program.

...This is a time for all of us to provide for his help and encouragement. Please keep Jim in your prayers, as he knows you keep him in your heart. As Jim would say "Keep Smiling."
